Summary: Remote teleconferenced meetings, during the continued existence of the Governor's proclaimed state of COVID-19 emergency, will be conducted under the provisions of AB 361 which added California Government Code Section 54953(e), to the Brown Act. Under the provisions of AB 361 and Government Code Section 54953(e), each District must adopt, by majority vote, a resolution making certain findings about the continuing COVID state of emergency and health and safety risks of conducting their meeting in person. By statute, this Resolution and its referenced findings, are only legally valid for 30 days. The Resolution is attached to the agenda.

REGULAR AGENDA

 Authorize Advertising and Receipt of Bids for Automated Solid Phase Extraction System for San Jose Creek Water Quality Laboratory

<u>Summary</u>: The proposed equipment will replace the 14-year-old system that has reached the end of its <u>useful life</u> and is no longer supported by the manufacturer. This system is currently used for performing sample extractions for organic constituents for a variety of permit-mandated monitoring and special studies. This item is consistent with the Districts' Guiding Principle to protect financial and facility assets through prudent investment and maintenance programs.

- 2. Authorize Issuance of Purchase Orders as Follows:
 - (a) To Angeles Contractor, Inc., in Amount of Approximately \$306,385 for San Jose Creek Water Reclamation Plant (SJCWRP) Operations and Laboratory Building Renovation

<u>Summary</u>: SJCWRP Operations and Laboratory building's lunchroom, conference room, offices, and hallways are in need of repair and renovation. The age and condition of many of these areas require upgrades such as new flooring and painting. The lighting will also be replaced to provide more energy-efficient lighting throughout these spaces. In addition, new cabinets, countertops, and fixtures will be installed in the lunchroom. Pursuant to authority previously granted by the Board, the project will be completed utilizing the Job Order Contracting Program which relies on pre-established competitively bid construction tasks that will accelerate project delivery and reduce administration and design costs. Staff has determined that the activities described are not subject to the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The activities described herein do not constitute a "Project" as that term is defined in California Public Resources Code Section 21065 and Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations ("CEQA Guidelines") Section 15378. This item is consistent with the Districts' Guiding Principles to protect financial and facility assets through prudent investment and maintenance programs, and commitment to operational excellence (protection of public health and the environment, regulatory compliance, and cost effectiveness).

(b) To Acco Engineered Systems in Amount of Approximately \$473,000 for Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) Improvements at Secondary Effluent Pump Station (SEPS) Control Building at Joint Water Pollution Control Plant

Summary: All five SEPS pump controls were recently replaced and placed in the SEPS control building. This building originally housed only two of the five pump controls and now does not have adequate ventilation to keep the building cool which can cause equipment failure and reduce the effective life of the equipment. This project includes installation of new HVAC units and all required ductwork and electrical work to improve ventilation and temperature control to the building. Pursuant to authority previously granted by the Board, the project will be completed utilizing the Job Order Contracting Program which relies on pre-established competitively-bid construction tasks that will accelerate project delivery and reduce administration and design costs. Staff has determined that the activities described are not subject to the provisions of California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The activities described herein do not constitute a "Project" as that term is defined in California Public Resources Code Section 21065 and Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations ("CEQA Guidelines") Section 15378. This item is consistent with the Districts' Guiding Principles to protect financial and facility assets through prudent investment and maintenance programs; and commitment to operational excellence (protection of public health and the environment, regulatory compliance, and cost effectiveness).

(c) To Nixon-Egli Equipment Co. in Amount of Approximately \$1,425,935 for One Used Linkbelt 75RT Crane and One New Linkbelt 75RT Crane; Find that One Lorain RT450 Crane and One Linkbelt RTC8050 Crane are No Longer Suitable for Districts' Purposes and Authorize Disposal

Summary: Mobile cranes are used at the Joint Water Pollution Control Plant (JWPCP) to assist in the installation, maintenance and repair of equipment (pumps, motors, engines, etc.), as well as to access hard to reach areas throughout the facility. Purchase of the mobile cranes is required to replace equipment at the JWPCP that is no longer cost-effective to maintain and does not meet future emission compliance requirements. Due to the long lead time on new equipment orders and one of the two existing cranes being out-of-service, staff recommends the purchase of one used crane that is immediately available. Purchase of the second, new mobile crane is recommended through the Sourcewell Cooperative Purchase Agreements (Sourcewell). Sourcewell provides nationally leveraged and competitively solicited purchasing contracts. Sourcewell provides a 20 percent discount off the list price, and Nixon-Egli Equipment Co. is the local authorized Linkbelt dealer and will provide an additional 6 percent discount. Purchasing the equipment through Sourcewell is the most cost-effective means of procurement. This item is consistent with the Districts' Guiding Principle of commitment to fiscal responsibility and prudent financial stewardship.

DIST. 2 -2- MAY 25, 2022

Authorize Payment to Aon Risk Services, Inc., (Aon) for Umbrella General Liability Insurance Coverage from Great American Assurance Company (GAAC) and Landmark American Insurance Company (LAIC) for All District Operations at Annual Premium of \$894,596.50

Summary: Proposals were solicited from 26 companies through Aon, the Districts' insurance broker, for renewal of umbrella general liability insurance, which covers wastewater, solid waste management, and energy recovery operations. Of the companies that were approached, two companies provided quotes which, combined, will provide the desired coverage. The best offer was from GAAC, the Districts' current carrier, with an excess layer from LAIC. The overall premium increased by approximately 10 percent over last year. The recommended coverage is for one year with a \$20 million limit including a \$5 million self-insured retention. The Districts procures \$1 million of underlying automobile liability insurance and self-insure for both automobile liability and general liability up to the \$5 million selfinsured retention amount. Overall, this level of coverage is the most cost-effective and appropriate approach for excess liability insurance. This item is consistent with the Districts' Guiding Principle of commitment to fiscal responsibility and prudent financial stewardship.

4. Adopt An Ordinance Prescribing Fee and Charge Rates for Solid Waste Management Activities at the Scholl Canyon Landfill (Ordinance) and find that the Ordinance is Exempt from California Environmental Quality Act Under Public Resources Code Section 21080(b)(8) because Rates and Charges are for Purpose of Meeting Operational Expenses, Purchasing Equipment, and Funding Capital Projects Necessary to Maintain Services within Existing Service Areas

Summary: A letter describing the recommended Board action and the rate increases planned for other District facilities was provided to the Directors prior to a public hearing and the introduction of the Ordinance on May 11, 2022. A copy of the letter and the proposed Ordinance accompanies the agenda. The Ordinance would increase the municipal solid and inert waste (MSW) rate at the Scholl Canyon Landfill from \$56.57 per ton to \$61.10 per ton effective July 1, 2022. Changes to the rates for hard-to-handle and bulky items, tires, special handling, pull-offs, uncovered loads capable of producing litter, and non-manifested tire loads are also proposed. The proposed rate increases are necessary to offset increasing operational and capital costs. The City of Glendale and Los Angeles County have concurred with the Districts' Guiding Principles of compriment to fixed increases. This item is consistent with the Districts' Guiding Principles of commitment to fiscal responsibility and prudent financial stewardship; and to plan for both short-term and long-term needs to minimize the need for significant rate increases.

5. Re: Audit of Sanitary Sewer Overflow (SSO) in the City of Carson Report and Recommendations

<u>Summary</u>: On December 30, 2021, during a heavy rainfall event, the Districts' 216th Street Relocation Trunk Sewer experienced a critical failure in the City of Carson causing an SSO event that impacted residents and closed local beaches. An independent external audit was performed by GHD, an engineering consulting firm, to determine the cause of the failure, evaluate the Districts' response, and conduct a programmatic review of the Districts' sewer maintenance and inspection programs and capital improvement program relative to industry standards. GHD's findings and recommendations for improvement are in the attached report. The Chief Engineer and General Manager will brief the Board.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT NO. 2 OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY, RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY ON MARCH 4, 2020 BY CALIFORNIA GOVERNOR AND AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODY

WHEREAS, the County Sanitation District No. 2 of Los Angeles County ("District") is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the District's Board of Directors and committees; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the District's Board of Directors are open and public, pursuant to the requirements of the Ralph M. Brown Act (California Government Code Sections 54950-54963) (the "Brown Act"), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, observe and watch the District's Board of Directors conduct business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Section 54953(e), allows for conducting and participating in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of the Brown Act Section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition under the Brown Act Section 54953(e) is the declaration of a state of emergency by the Governor pursuant to California Government Code Section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within California caused by the conditions outlined and described in California Government Code Section 8558; and

WHEREAS, a proclamation of a state of emergency is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the District's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-induced disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that the state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or the Board of Directors of the District have held a meeting where it considered and determined that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, such conditions now exist in the District as Governor Newsom declared a State of Emergency on March 4, 2020 as a result of the threat of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the County of Los Angeles Department of Public Health Order of the Health Officer issued March 3, 2022 (the "County Order") includes recommendations that all persons within the jurisdiction of the County of Los Angeles public health agency always practice required and recommended infection control measures when among others, especially in an indoor setting; and

WHEREAS, the District's Board of Directors does hereby find that the ongoing and significant risks associated with COVID-19 infection, especially in the absence of capacity limits and physical distancing requirements for indoor activities, on those individuals with underlying health conditions that make them susceptible to severe COVID-19 illness and individuals who are not and cannot be vaccinated, that COVID-19 infection remains a significant health hazard to all residents, and desires to proclaim a local emergency and ratify the proclamation of a state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California, and further, ratify the County Order findings related to the ongoing health hazards of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the declared state of emergency and the local emergency, the Board of Directors of the District does hereby find that the District shall continue to conduct its meetings in accordance with the provisions and requirements of the Brown Act Section 54953(e), and that the legislative bodies of the District shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to, and an opportunity to comment at all meetings of the District's legislative bodies in accordance with the requirements of the Brown Act Section 54953(e)(2); and

WHEREAS, the District will continue its practice of live streaming its meetings via the Zoom software platform which allows members of the public to observe and participate in the meetings via video or callin options and will continue to offer members of the public an opportunity to make oral comments during the meetings and/or submit written comments before the meetings.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT NO. 2 OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The Recitals set forth above are true, correct, and are incorporated in this Resolution by reference.

Section 2. <u>Proclamation of Local Emergency</u>. The Board of Directors of the District does herby proclaim that a local <u>emergency</u> now exists throughout the territory of the District and, as described in the County Order, recommendations from health officers include ongoing masking, and social distancing practices especially for indoor settings and particularly for individuals who, due to vaccine status or underlying health conditions, continue to be at risk for severe illness, and COVID-19 infection remains a significant health hazard to all residents of the District.

Section 3. <u>Ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency</u>. The District's Board of Directors hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of a State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.

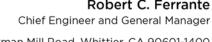
Section 4. <u>Remote Teleconference Meetings</u>. The Chief Engineer and General Manager, staff and legislative bodies are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, without limitation, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with the Brown Act Section 54953(e) and all other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 5. Effective Date of Resolution. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of 30 days after the date of this resolution, or such time that the District's Board of Directors adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with the Brown Act Section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the legislative bodies of the District may continue to teleconference without compliance with the requirements of the Brown Act Section 54953(b)(3).

Rate Increases for Solid Waste Management Facilities

The agenda for the May 11, 2022, meeting of the Board of Directors of Sanitation District No. 2 includes an item to consider introducing a new Rate Ordinance for Scholl Canyon Landfill. The proposed Ordinance would increase the Municipal Solid and Inert Waste (MSW) rate from \$56.57 per ton to \$61.10 per ton. Changes to the rates for Hard-to-Handle and Bulky Items, Tires, Special Handling, Pull-Offs, Uncovered Loads Capable of Producing Litter, and Non-manifested Tire Loads are also proposed. The proposed Ordinance is attached to the agenda. If approved, the new Ordinance would take effect July 1, 2022.

In addition to the proposed rate changes at the Scholl Canyon Landfill, the rates at Puente Hills Material Recover Facility (MRF), South Gate Transfer Station (SGTS), and Downey Area Recycling and Transfer (DART) Facility are being increased as allowed under the current rate ordinance that covers these sites. The MSW rate at the Puente Hills MRF would increase from \$77.84 per ton to \$81.73 per ton. The MSW rate at SGTS would increase from \$83.68 per ton to \$87.86 per ton. The MSW rate at DART would increase from \$82.86 per ton to \$87.01 per ton. Changes to the rates for Hard-to-Handle and Bulky Items and Pull-Offs are also proposed at all three facilities.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles is responsible for setting rates at the Calabasas Landfill and are expected to increase the MSW rate from \$52.32 per ton to \$60.32 per ton at their May 17, 2022 Board meeting.

The proposed rate increases are necessary to offset increasing operational and capital costs. A schedule of all the facilities' current and proposed rates is attached.

AN ORDINANCE PRESCRIBING FEE AND CHARGE RATES FOR SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ACTIVITIES AT THE SCHOLL CANYON LANDFILL

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT NO. 2 OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1 SHORT TITLE

This Ordinance shall be known as the Scholl Canyon Landfill Solid Waste Rate Ordinance.

SECTION 2 PURPOSE

The purpose of this Ordinance is to establish the fee and charge rates prescribed by County Sanitation District No. 2 of Los Angeles County for the Scholl Canyon Landfill, and to provide for customer credit agreements.

SECTION 3 FEES AND CHARGES

The following fee and charge rates are hereby prescribed for the Scholl Canyon Landfill, effective July 1, 2022:

Municipal Solid and Inert Waste (1-ton minimum)	\$ 61.10 per ton
Hard-to-Handle, Bulky Items (1-ton minimum)	\$ 76.10 per ton
Tires	\$ 107.79 per ton
Special Handling	\$ 76.02 per ton
Pull-offs	\$ 50.14 per load

SECTION 4 UNCOVERED LOADS AND NON-MANIFESTED TIRE LOADS

A surcharge of \$5.40 per ton, subject to a minimum charge of \$5.40 per load, will be charged with respect to all uncovered loads capable of producing litter.

A surcharge of \$5.40 per ton, subject to a minimum charge of \$5.40 per load, will be charged with respect to all non-manifested tire loads.

SECTION 5 RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

- 5.1 The District's Chief Engineer and General Manager shall have the authority to adjust any fee or charge rate for the acceptance of materials determined to be of benefit to the operation of the facility, or which would promote solid waste management alternatives. These materials may include but are not restricted to dirt suitable for cover material; segregated shredded or unshredded organic material suitable for composting, cover material, or recycling; broken asphaltic concrete; various other recyclable materials; and like substances.
- 5.2 The Chief Engineer shall determine the materials and services that are eligible for a rate adjustment and the amount of the rate adjustment. The Chief Engineer shall make the determination in writing and it will be made available to members of the public on request.

SECTION 6 CREDIT AGREEMENTS

The Chief Engineer may offer credit agreements to solid waste facility customers for payment of fees and charges. The Chief Engineer shall establish and enforce policies for administration of credit agreements, subject to all applicable laws and regulations.

SECTION 7 COLLECTION OF FEES PURSUANT TO THE PUBLIC RESOURCES CODE

All fees and charges specified in Section 3 of this Ordinance include an amount necessary to cover fees required pursuant to Sections 48000 through 48008 of the Public Resources Code (imposed by the State of California under Section 48000), Sections 40900 through 41956 of the Public Resources Code (imposed by the County of Los Angeles under Section 41901), and Sections 43200 through 43610.1 of the Public Resources Code (imposed by the County of Los Angeles under Section 43213).

Section 8 COLLECTION OF FEES AND TAXES PURSUANT TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY ORDINANCES

All fees and charges specified in this Ordinance include an amount necessary to collect fees imposed by the County of Los Angeles pursuant to Los Angeles County Ordinances Nos. 2008-0056 and 2011-0042.

SECTION 9 COLLECTION OF FEES PURSUANT TO CITY OF GLENDALE ORDINANCE

All fees and charges specified in Sections 3, 4, and 5 of this Ordinance include an amount necessary to collect fees imposed by the City of Glendale pursuant to City of Glendale Ordinance No. 5282.

SECTION 10 COLLECTION OF REVISED OR NEW FEES AND TAXES

The District's Chief Engineer and General Manager shall have the authority to increase or decrease, as appropriate and at any time, any fees and charges specified in Sections 3, 4, or 5 of this Ordinance by an amount estimated to equal any revision in the fees or taxes specified in Sections 7, 8, and 9 of this Ordinance, or by an amount estimated to equal any mandatory new fees or taxes imposed by federal, state, or local government which must be paid by County Sanitation District No. 2 of Los Angeles County as operator of the Scholl Canyon Landfill.

SECTION 11 SUPERSESSION

This Ordinance shall supercede any fees or charges relating to the Scholl Canyon Landfill imposed pursuant to the Scholl Canyon Landfill Solid Waste Rate Ordinance adopted May 26, 2021.

SECTION 12 EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall become effective on July 1, 2022.
